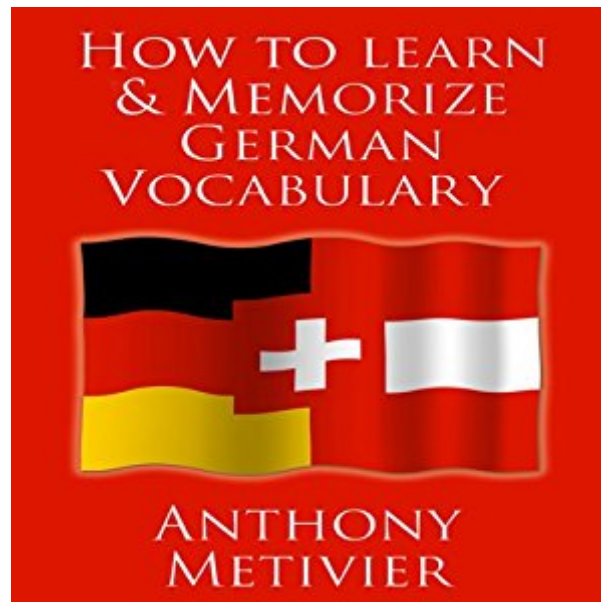

Okay, call me stupid. I am mystified by a method where I create, in my memory, twenty-six mental locations alphabetized a-z, each location (or 'palace') to contain many 'rooms', where I store words. THEN, having created all these 'palaces', to recall for each 'room' some exciting or hilarious memory from my life which I may use for creating a link to each new word in the German language. Then to memorize the dictionary. For me, it is beyond clutter. I can't even remember 26 alphabetized locations, never mind the rooms where each word belongs. The word 'abbiegen', okay, that goes where? Into palace 'A', the house where I lived as a kid. Where should I put 'abbiegen'? Well, it means 'to turn off', so do I put it in the kitchen and 'turn off the tap'? No, that's not the meaning of THIS turn off. I should put it in the hallway, I guess, where the hall turns the corner from the front room to the kitchen. Oops, this particular 'palace', the house where I lived as a kid, didn't have a hallway. Matter of fact, I don't quite remember the layout of that house. Though I shall probably now remember 'abbiegen' forever. Lightbulb moment. I'll continue to try this. If it works out, I'll change the stars. It is two days later. I changed the stars. The method is not less convoluted, but I have discovered that the physical presence in my mind of a building with many rooms actually does work. For me, it is hard work. The visualisation is sometimes a real chore. But here's the magic. Once you've done all that work, the word is there. It's right there, exactly where you put it; and it comes when called. According to Anthony Metivier, the work does get easier and more automatic, until it becomes second nature.

I used this book to learn more Arrernte vocabulary - even though it's aimed at people learning German. Arrernte is Australian Aboriginal language that is TOTALLY unlike any European language, so I would argue that if the method is going to fail, then it will fail with a language like Arrernte. I should also add that I read this book in conjunction with doing the author's online course, as I find I learn by reading, thinking and doing much easier than watching or listening to lectures, greatly benefited from the book. First up, it should be stated that this technique is not for lazy people or those who want a 'quick fix'™. It involves creating complex mental imagery and higher-level cognitive processing, which is in fact why you're able to recall the words and their meanings as you walk through your mental journey. The system can be summarised in these steps: 1. Imagine a

place that starts with a letter of the alphabet in the language you're learning (places like shopping centres and university campuses or highways worked best for me) – this is the "palace"

Identify 10 words starting with this letter that you wish to remember

Within your place (let's use a the Stuart Highway, going north, from Port Augusta in South Australia), identify 10 stations or locations along the way – take great care NOT to get into a dead end, though.

Create mnemonic images (the more outrageous the better) to help you recall your words (i.e. to remember the word for Victoria Wattle in Arrernte – "arlepe (pronounced "a leper") I imagined lots of lepers running naked through this prickly wattle!)

Place each image at a location within the palace

Rinse and repeat for each letter of the alphabet in your target language.

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
